MIYAGI OLLE TRAIL The Miyagi Olle Trail starts with the Kesennuma/Karakuwa Trail along the

majestic Pacific Coast and the Oku-Matsushima Trail which overlooks Matsushima, one of the three scenic spots in Japan.

The Miyagi Olle Trail was created as a sister trail to those in Jeju (Korea), Kyushu and Mongolia. It is the first on Japan's main island of Honshu.

Miyagi Olle Trail, a Healing Journey

Matsushima, its picturesque bay dotted with islands large and small, is the start of the journey to Miyagi Prefecture, a region rich with natural beauty. In the west is a range of mountains stretching from Mt. Zao to Mt. Funagata to Mt. Kurikoma. In the center, rice fields stretch out as far as the eye can see, with a beauty that changes from season to season, and is ideal for experiencing traditional culture. The coastal area was badly damaged by tsunami caused by the 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake, but the coastal and mountain trails are being restored to their former beauty.

Disaster became the opportunity which sparked the creation of the Miyagi Olle Trail, and with assistance from the Jeju Olle Foundation, the Miyagi Olle Trail was created as a sister trail to those in Jeju (Korea), Kyushu and Mongolia.

Miyagi Olle Trail has diverse routes, ranging from trails which travel by the endless stretch of the Pacific Ocean, to the natural richness of forested trails, to country roads with opportunities to meet local residents. While there are similarities to the Jeju Olle and Kyushu Olle, Miyagi has its own unique features. Olle trails are characterized by people coexisting with nature, and this is firmly embedded in Miyagi Olle as well.

Karakuwa Town, Kesennuma City is a small town located on a peninsula in the northern part of Miyagi Prefecture. It has a population of approximately 6,200 and an area of 42 km2. From the dynamic ria coast to the scenery of the Sanriku Geopark, and seasonal flora, there is much to enjoy. The Olle trail goes from the Karakuwa Peninsula Visitor Center at the tip of the peninsula to Ogama Hanzo, a famous landmark in the Sanriku Fukko National Park. As you begin your hike along the coast, you can see giant stones that were ripped from the sea floor and cast ashore by the 2011 tsunami.

A special feature of this area, which on average has experi-

enced a tsunami every 37 years, is a strong disaster warning system and disaster preparedness education. People here chose to live as one with the sea through the generations despite suffering from tsunami and have learned from painful experience that "you cannot defy nature." As you walk along this trail you can begin to understand the distinct culture of this place whose inhabitants live both in fear of nature and as one with the sea. The trail passes by a number of shrines that were part of pilgrimage paths to pray for safety related to the sea, and the town is dotted with more than 70 such shrines. This Olle connects with a pilgrimage route where wives prayed for the safety of their husbands away at sea, and also with a path used in daily life. This is a special trail course where you can experience the culture and lifestyle of the people of Karakuwa who live in harmony with the sea.







Cape Osaki

A scenic spot at the tip of the peninsula to view the Pacific Ocean. The unique surface of the rock reminiscent of mille-feuille is actually sedimentary rock which dates back some 250 million years, and this area has been designated as one of Japan's top 100 geological features and the highlight of the Sanriku Geopark.

< Osaki Shrine

This shrine is within a thick Japanese Bay tree forest. Dating back over 1000 years, it is said to help with romantic relationships and good harvest of fish. Nearby there is a Whale Monument dedicated to a whale worshipped as a divine messenger, where you can feel the depth of the faith of these people of the sea.

< Kannokura Tsunami Stones

These giant stones were unearthed from the sea floor and cast ashore on March 11, 2011 by the tsunami. The largest of these stones has a diameter of about 6 meters and estimated weight of 150 tons. You can feel the terrible force of the tsunami here.

∧ Tsubaki Tunnel

In Karakuwa there are more than 20,000 tsubaki (camellia) trees. In March- April the red flowers make it a flower tunnel and flower path.



As is typical for ria coastal areas like the Karakuwa Peninsula, there is a range of inlets large and small which locals use as harbors for fishing. The harbor is also known for its beautiful pebbles on the beach.



∧ Yaemonzaka

Local residents labored to revive this ancient path for the OIIe. It was named after a Christian missionary named "Yaemon" who lived nearby a long time ago.



∧ Oreishi Stone Column

This is the scenic gem of the Sanriku Fukko National Park. This stone column rises 16 meter out of the open ocean. In 1896 it was damaged by a large tsunami which broke off the tip, giving it its current name, Oreishi ("broken stone"). There is a similar stone on the Jeju Olle's 7th course called "Oedolgae Rock."

∨ Hanzo

This beautiful stretch of coastline is known for "Day lillies" and "Nippon daisies" which bloom in between these unusual stones. It is an ideal place to watch the sun rise over the horizon.

Kesennuma Fishing Port / Kesennuma Fish Market



This is one of just 13 ports in Japan designated as category 3 (large). Each day brings a new haul of fresh seasonal catch from the Sannku fishing grounds, one of top three most productive in the world. Not limited to local fisheries, this port is home to oceanic fishing vessels which bring in some of the country's largest catches of bonito, saury, swordfish, shark and more. The second floor has a 354-meter-long observation deok, among the largest in Japan, giving visitors the perfect vantage point to watch the lively auction take place below in the early morning. Bidding begins at about 7 a.m., and the scene of fish arranged for sale is a remarkable sight.

The Only Shark Museum in Japan

Adjacent to Kesennuma Fish Market is a building called "Kesennuma Umi no Ichi", a good sightseeing spot with all the favorite local products on offer. On the first floor are fish, shellfish and processed seafood from Kesennuma Port as well as restaurants. The second floor has a tourism information center as well as Japan's only shat museum, At the Kesennuma Tourism & Convention Bureau you can get information about what to see in the city, where to eat and where to stay. The Kesennuma Shark Museum has life-sized shark models and exhibits to help you easily understand their unusual biology. Surprises and wonder await at this museum which can only be found in Kesennuma, the capital of shark fishing. In addition, in the "Recovery Theater" of the same museum there is a 15-minute video covering the disaster, recovery and future from the viewpoint of local residents.

Trail to experience the ancient landscape of Matsushima, the land of whispering winds and blue seas

This landscape with water as calm as a lake, and dotted by countless islands, is so beautiful it seems like a painting.

Matsushima, one of the Three Most Scenic Spots of Japan, has an eastern part called Oku-Matsushima. It encompasses the largest island in Matsushima Bay, Miyato Island, and the Nobiru coastline which stretches along the Pacific Ocean. With its relatively mild climate, many camellia flowers bloom in early spring and wild windmill palm trees flourish, prompting a comparison with the famous Izu Peninsula near Tokyo. The still waters of the inner bay and the waves of the ocean make possible a wealth of activities; swimming, wind-surfing, fishing, and drag-net fishing, which can be enjoyed throughout the year. This area is also a Miyagi Prefecture International Tourism Theme Area.

The Oku-Matsushima Trail begins at the Selco Home Aomina Visitor Center. Experience the history and nature from the prehistoric Jomon period to many of today's most picturesque spots as you hike through Oku-Matsushima and Miyato Island. The start of the course is a trail dating back to prehistoric times. In the Satohama Historical Park, step back in time and visit the Satohama Shell Mound from the Jomon period, one of the largest in Japan. At Inagasaki Park and on top of Otakamori (one of the four panoramic views of Matsushima), you can enjoy a 360-degree view of Oku-Matsushima's landscape. This course is also an opportunity enjoy delicious seafood and the warm hospitality of local residents.









∧ Selco Home Aomina Visitor Center

This is the starting and finishing point for the Oku-Matsushima Trail. Find local souvenirs here as well as drinks and snacks. Rest your tired feet in a footbath. With the Oku-Matsushima Pleasure Boat Visitor Center also inside this building, you can start your exploration of Oku-Matsushima here.



< Otakamori Yakushido Temple

This temple was built in 1915 half-way up the Otakamori hillside by then Miyagi Governor Masataka Mori. Inside there is a Yakushi Nyorai (Buddha of healing) statue made of unvarnished wood. When Kozoji Temple in the Igu District in Southern Miyagi was renovated, the center pillar was carved into Yakushi Nyorai, Prince Shotoku Taishi and 33 Kannon statues, and the Yakushi Nyorai was dedicated to the Otakamori Yakushido Temple.



This museum displays clay pots, bone tools, stone tools and costumes that were excavated from the Satohama Shell Mound on Miyato Island. The shell mound dates from the pre-historic Jomon period and is registered as a National Historic Site. There are hands-on activities to let you experience life in the Jomon period. The museum is dedicated to the wisdom and culture of the ancient Jomon people who lived as one with nature.

∧ Shinhama Promontory

Beyond the path lies the beautiful blue of the sea. It is known as "the horse's back" for the shape of the rock promontory. The sunny lookout point is a perfect place to take a rest.



Behind the Satohama Historical Park stands a large sacred bay tree. This type of tree is an evergreen related to the camphor tree. It grows in warm coastal areas from central-southern Tohoku to the south and has been mistaken for the similar-looking camphor tree.

Inagasaki Park

From the viewing area in the park you can see the Zao mountain range, Matsushima Bay, the Oshika Peninsula, and on clear days as far as Soma in Fukushima. Also in the area are camellia forests whose red flowers and vivid green leaves contrast beautifully when they are in bloom.



The transparent blue water and bright sand set this beach apart. In summer it is open for swimming and is popular with the public. As the waves are calm, the beach is well-suited for children and families.



^ Forest Path through History

This forested path starts at Kanonji Temple. According to the chief priest, "It's a road that comes alive when people walk upon it." It used to connect settlements and was a school route. Surrounded by green, it is a path to walk on and feel refreshed



^ Satohama Historical Park

The Satohama Shell Mound began before the Jomon period and continued until the Yayoi era, making it among the largest shell mounds in Japan. From the eastern part of the lookout, the scenery is wonderful and you view the same sea the ancient Jomon people once gazed upon. In spring there are yellow canola blossoms, and in summer soba flowers bloom in terraced fields.



∧ Riku no Oku-Matsushima

Oku-Matsushima's famous rock faces bear traces of their underwater origins. Even locations that are at present rice fields were once part of the sea.



∨ Otakamori

This 105.8 meter mountain at the center of Miyato Island is one of Matsushima's four panoramic views, known as the "Gorgeous View." Prince Noriyoshi (1328-1368) and Sendai's samurai ruler Date Masamune (1567-1636) praised the view from the peak. There is a 360-degree panoramic view of Matsushima Bay and the Pacific Ocean. At dusk, Matsushima Bay glistens in a beautiful golden light. In addition, there is a large stone dedicated to the protector Raijin (the god of thunder). This is also a good place to watch the sunrise.

In this Higashi-Matsushima specialty, udon noodles are infused with nori seaweed. This popular item is marked by its smooth texture and subtle nori flavor. Especially recommended are the chilled "hiyashi nori udon," nori udon salad, and other variations made by the chefs of different restaurants. Dried noodles make a perfect souvenir and can be bought together with a special noodle soup.

Nobiru Baum Cake

Made with wheat and rice flour grown in the Nobiru area of Higashi-Matsushima, this type of Baumkuchen ring cake is made by the farmers themselves. Nobiru Baum comes in three varieties: soft, hard and children's, with large sizes and ones that fit in the palm of your hand, making them perfect for souverins or sending as a present.



Ovsters

These oysters are grown in the mineral-rich water from two Class A streams flowing down from the Ou mountains. They have a large and rich meat with a sweetly rich flavor. Enjoy them prepared in many ways at local establishments including grilled at a local oyster shack, in a nabe stew, or fried

Higashi-Matsushima City is located in central Miyagi Prefecture, between Ishinomaki City and the town of Matsushima. Matsushima Bay has a reputation as a rich fishing ground with flourishing seaweed and oyster farms. The city is home to the Matsushima Air Base, if you're lucky, you can see the Blue Impulse acrobatic squadron practicing in the sky above.

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Top 3 Tastes of Miyagi Zunda Gyutan Sasakamaboko

Miyagi Prefecture is a destination for excellent dining. While practically overflowing with fresh seafood from the Sanriku Coast, there are other foods Miyagi locals think you must try. "Zunda," made from green edamame soybeans, is used in a variety of ways. Miyagi's soul food is Gyutan, or grilled beef tongue. Miyagi is a top savory fish cake producer and makes these "Sasakamaboko" in the shape of a bamboo leaf. Sample them all for the true Miyagi culinary experience.



Top 3 Places of Miyagi Date Masamune Historical Museum Zao Naruko Onsen

In Miyagi Prefecture, many places related to the first ruler of the Sendai domain, Date Masamune, remain to this day. Masamune once ruled from Sendai Castle, and today the site where the castle stood is a history museum which tells the story of how this samurai hero led Miyagi to prosperity. Located in the southern part of the prefecture is Zao, with a volcanic crater lake that will impress you with its natural beauty. In northern Miyagi, Naruko Onsen is a hot spring area famous for its many distinct types of springs, and is one of many places in Miyagi worth including in your visit.



The Amazinaly Versatile Edamame

Zunda

Zunda is made from edamame, or young soybeans, that are ground into a paste. In Miyagi Prefecture there are a variety of zunda dishes. The best known is zunda mochi, where sweet zunda paste is spread on top of sweet mochi rice cakes. In recent years, a category of zunda sweets using the ground edamame has emerged. Recently, zunda is used in savory snacks and dishes, zunda transcends food genres.



Gyutan

This slightly unusual delicacy began in Sendai and then spread throughout Japan. Gyutan, which means cow tongue, is seasoned, cured, and then grilled over charcoals. Miyagi gyutan is extravagantly thick, does not use the tougher base of the tongue, and carefully selects the soft center part, giving it a rich texture that is easy to eat. Gyutan originated in Sendai in the chaotic days following the end of World War II, when Japanese people cooked and ate beef parts discarded by the occupying American troops. It has garnered such popularity over the years that there is even luxury pet food made with Gyutan for sale today.

Sasakamaboko

Seafood powerhouse Miyagi Prefecture is also the top producer of fish paste, with a 10% national market share. Sasakamaboko fish cakes are a Miyagi specialty made from this fish paste. Sasakamaboko is made by forming the savory cakes into the shape of a bamboo leaf, adding starch and then steamed or grilled. In Miyagi, restaurants often put sasakamaboko on a bamboo skewer and grill them on a hibachi (traditional Japanese grill). There are also new variations including sasakamaboko with cheese. salami. or even sea urchin inside.



Meet Miyagi's Samurai Hero

Date Masamune

Date Masamune lived from the end of the warring Sengoku period until the early Edo period. He became the first ruler of the Sendai domain and led it to prosperity. When he was young, he lost his right eye to smallpox, and while short in stature he was tireless as a military commander and became an exemplary samurai ruler. In 1602, just before the start of the Edo period, Date Masamune built his castle on Aobayama in Sendai, a hill with a view as far as the ocean. Sadly, Sendai Castle, which had led the Miyagi area to a Renaissance, was partially torn down in the late 19th century during

Meiji period and then completely destroyed during the bombing of Sendai during World War II. You can see Date Masamune's legacy and discover his legend for yourself in the history museum at the castle site as well as other locations across Miyagi.

Feel Deep Nature in Miyagi's Mountains

Zao

The Zao Echo Line traverses the Zao Mountain range from east to west, and is steep and notoriously high. It is the ideal place to see the beautiful scenery of Mt. Zao, and as you can enjoy the unique scenery and alpine plants, it is a popular route for driving. For a full autumn experience, see the leaves change color from the end of September. The Zao Okama crater lake, formed by an eruption in 1182, has a circumference of approximately 1 kilometer, and reaches depths of 25 meters. Many people climb to the peak of Mt. Kattadake for its view of the Okama lake. As there is a walking trail



that connects the mountain peaks, hiking is a great way to see the whole area.



One-Stop Shop for Hot Springs

Naruko Onsen

Naruko is a historic onsen hot spring village consisting of five individual hot spring areas that is located in Osaki City, Miyagi Prefecture. Naruko Onsen is prized for its health benefits and its excellent water quality. It is a popular place to visit as you can conveniently try nine distinct types of hot spring water in a single area. There are nearly 400 hot spring sources in Naruko, and this variety makes it the ultimate one-stop shop for onsen. Nearby is Naruko Gorge, a steep ravine originally formed by volcanic activity. 4-6 kilometers long, 80-100 meters tall and just 10 meters wide, Naruko Gorge is famous for its stunning fall colors.

Kesennuma and Karakuwa trail course Miyaqi 0 Oku matsushima trail course Mivagi Miyagi Prefecture is located in the Tohoku region in the northeastern part of the main island, Honshu. It borders the Pacific Ocean and is some 300 km from Tokyo. Sendai, the region's central city, is 1.5 hours from Tokyo via the Tohoku Shinkansen high-speed bullet train. There are regular international flights along 5 routes to Taipei, Beijing and more. Miyagi Prefecture's average annual temperature is 11°C, average annual rainfall is 1245 mm, and it has a population of about 2.3 million with 1 million residing in Sendai City, the capital of Miyagi. Off the coast, cold and warm ocean currents meet to form a fertile fishing ground which produces a diversity of seafood. Miyagi makes a variety of processed marine products and oysters, nori and wakame seaweeds and more are farmed in the northern ria coast.

1 Follow the Miyagi Olle Markers (Kanse horses, ribbons, arrows) and stay on the trail.

②Refrain from any dangerous activities in steep areas outside the trail.

Wear appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoor hiking.When walking on roads, watch out for cars.

⑤ Do not hike during typhoons, heavy rain, heavy snow or other inclement weather.

What is Miyagi Olle?





Originally from Jeju, Korea, Olle Trails have now begun in Miyagi Prefecture. Olle mean "the alleys that lead home from the main road" in Jeju dialect, but now refer to hiking courses and walking paths. The appeal of Olle is that they both bring you into nature, whether the coast or in the mountains, and bring you close to homes, and are a way to enjoy yourself at your own

The Miyagi Olle was created as a sister to those in Jeju (Korea), Kyushu and Mongolia. Miyagi Olle is a special hiking course that lets you experience the history, landscape and hot springs, and culture of the area with your five senses.

Miyage Olle Mark

The symbol of Miyagi Olle is a color representative of Japanese culture, the color of the torii gates of shrines. Just like the original Jeju Olle, the Kanse horses, arrows and ribbons will show you the way.
